Word from the Provincial



DREAM IT LIVE IT CELEBRATE IT - it is an advert I see often at meals. Coca cola bottles marketed in Botswana bear them alongside FIFA soccer cup, wooing more and more new consumers. During my recent visit to LUMKO I witnessed the rainbow nation dreaming, living and celebrating the forthcoming 2010 FIFA Soccer World Cup in all aspects of life with vuvuzelas fast becoming an iconic symbol of celebration. Vuvuzela is a meter long, brightly colored plastic horn that sounds like an elephant up-close, and when blown frantically it sounds a massive swarm of very angry bees. The ancestor of the vuvuzela is said to be the kudu horn - *ixilongo* in isiXhosa, *mhalamhala* in Tshivenda - blown to summon African villagers to meetings. Some say it comes from the isiZulu for - wait for it - "making noise". Others say it's from township slang related to the word "shower", because it "showers people with music". Adding to

the appeal is the African folklore that "A baboon is killed by a lot of noise." During the last quarter of a match, supporters blow vuvuzelas frantically in an attempt to "kill off" their opponents. The Official World Cup Ball is named "JABULANI" which means "to celebrate" in isiZulu. The "JABULANI" ball sports an impressive 11 different colours to represent the 11 players who take the field for every team during the tournament and the 11 official languages of South Africa, and the 11 South African tribes that make the country extremely diverse as a rainbow nation.

Season of Advent and Christmas is a paradoxical combination of waiting, hastening and celebrating life in its diversities and rainbow colors. Various infancy narratives in the gospels manifest it. It summons us *to wait for*, and to *pitch* the ultimate dream of God- God becoming human in every child, and every child nursing the earth as the body of God. The multitude of heavenly host with the angel summoned the shepherds- *Glory to God in the highest and on earth peace to those on whom his favor rests*. In Christmas we celebrate *the Human face of Divine Compassion*. It is our dream too, to become *Human Face of Divine Compassion in respect, solidarity and love*. But there are dreams that cannot be, and storms we cannot weather in time gone by and time to come. *What came to be through him was life, and this life was the light of the human race; the light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it*. Christmas calls us to hasten in embracing a missionary spirituality of weakness. Sin resides not in weakness but in strength. Divine Compassion is often experienced in the whirlpools of pain and loss. Christmas challenges us to look at the ways that we wait, the ways that we hasten, and the ways that we celebrate to become *the Human Face of Divine Compassion*.

Becoming *the Human Face of Divine Compassion* is an ongoing process of maturation through integrated and harmonious personal growth. A compassionate religious is also a contemplative critic. In the harmonious integration of all dimensions of my personhood I begin to dream the dream of God! After all a *baboon is killed by a lot of noise!* Therefore, with a compassionate thrust for a prophetic presence let us **DREAM IT LIVE IT CELEBRATE IT**. Merry Christmas and Happy New year!

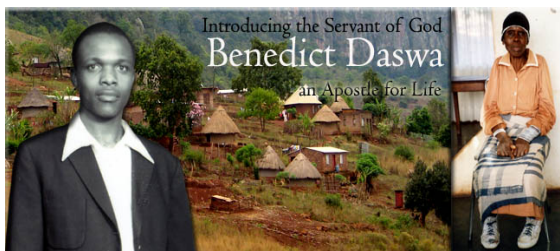


BISHOP HUGH SLATTERY CELEBRATES SILVER JUBILEE



Bishop Hugh Slattery celebrated the silver jubilee of his Episcopal ordination as the Bishop of Tzaneen. The beautiful celebration took place on 1st November 2009, on the Feast of all Saints at Ave Maria Pastoral Center. In a letter dated 5 November 2009 he thanked us for our presence during the celebration, and much more for our commitment to the Tsonga Speaking areas of Tzaneen. During the Eucharistic celebration a DVD on a servant of God Benedict Daswa was launched. It is about the life story of Tshimangadzo Samuel Daswa Bakali, a primary school teacher. He grew up in a traditionalist family. He belonged to the Lemba tribe who live mainly among the Venda people in the Limpopo Province.

He took the name Benedict at his baptism. He witnessed to the Gospel by taking a public stance against witchcraft. He was stoned and bludgeoned to death on 2 February for the faith. On Thursday 2nd July 2009, a historic event took place in Tzaneen as the Diocesan Inquirers into the Life and Death of Benedict Daswa was concluded. THE VOICE OF SAN ETHNIC TRIBES DIES



On the 18th of November our friend pastor Braam Le Roux from Shakawe passed away. He was born in 1951 in South Africa. In 1982 he arrived in

Botswana as a missionary of the Reformed Church. It was about the same time when the SVDs started to work in the country. Braam began in D'Kar near Ghanzi.

Very soon he got involved in the struggle for the livelihoods and the recognition of the San People. He saw the need of creating an NGO helping the most marginalised, poor and abused minority ethnic groups of the Kalahari – and so the Kuru Project was born. In 1986 it became the Kuru Development Trust. The trust grew tremendously and in 1998 it became necessary to split it into several independent NGOs, forming a Kuru Family of Organisations (KFO). Also in 1998 he started a northern branch of Kuru for the Ngamiland based in Shakawe and

called TOCaDI.

Braam was involved in the formation of the "First People of the Kalahari" and of the Working Groups of Indigenous Peoples in Southern Africa (WIMSA). Those organisations gained the worldwide recognition for the support of the San People.

Braam had tremendous respect for the culture of the San. His missionary development and social work impacted countless people of Botswana, creating opportunities for the poorest and most neglected. He had many dreams and only few of them became a reality, but a reality that brought real difference and change.

He was fluent in Setswana and Naro – a San language. He was the first who, with the help of the San women, translated the church hymns into Naro. He was instrumental in encouraging the linguistic work, translations into San languages and preservation of the San culture.

We had the privilege to meet this extraordinary man and became his friends. He was a very simple and humble person, full of dignity and conviction. He was somebody who inspired others, us included. Although a Protestant he showed us great respect and understanding.

Braam was fascinated and happy to hear about our envisaged Lefoko Centre. We shared with him our dream. He was hoping to cooperate one day on several levels – especially related to culture of the San and other people, to their religion, Biblical work and various development projects.

Looking at his life and work we felt very humble and a bit ashamed that so little has been done on our part. We envied also his freedom of doing what was right. We knew however that he had gone through tremendous trials and periods of disappointment, lack of understanding, appreciation and gratitude. Only now, after his death, the people realise the vast contribution of this man. We learned a lot from him and from his wife Willemien, who continues his work.

Braam was also a man of integrity. He openly chal-

lenged the famous and powerful international organisation Survival International for misreporting on the situation of the San People in Botswana, for spreading false information and exaggerating facts (story reported on the BBC). One of the custodians of Kuru testified that Braam indeed opened up the minds of the San people. “He made us realise that it is ok to be a San, which we now appreciate”. He truly became the **VOICE** of voiceless. He was buried in Samochima near Shakawe.

Celebrating Braam’s life we ponder about our own missionary life and commitment, especially among the poorest and most marginalised, about our option for the poor, about our characteristic dimensions and freedom to do what is right and what has to be done.

A JOURNEY TO AFRICA FROM THE SOUTH PACIFIC



The news from the African continent played a part in how I view the world in general when I was growing up on the island of Taveuni, to the north of the Fiji Islands in the South Pacific. Fiji has about 300 islands with only 10% habited. Suva is the capital city.

It has 26 provinces, chiefs, and dialects. English and Fijian are the two major languages. Christianity, Hinduism, Islam are the major religions represented. Sugar, Tourism, and Textiles are the big income earners. Currently Fiji is run by an interim military government await-

ing democratic election in 2011. As a result, there are bans on certain aspects on its relationship to the outside world.

I was baffled when I watched a movie about *Idi Amin* of how people could be so controlling and abusive, I prayed for and mourned the devastating hunger that swept Somalia in the ‘80s, I celebrated and rejoiced in the breaking of the Apartheid, I smiled and sang when I watched a movie shot in Soweto called *Sarafina*, and I admire the greatness in the man of *Nelson Mandela*. I jumped and cheered with excitement when South Africa won the Rugby World Cup while hosting it in 2005. I sang along when South African reggae star, *Lucky Dube*, toured Fiji in the ‘90s, and shed tears when South Africa buried him in 2007.

Yes, the power of television has made the world share its challenges and triumphs. But never in my wildest dream had I thought that I will travel to and walk this holy continent. I joined the SVD in the Australian Province back in 2000 after collecting taxes for the Fiji government for four years. In 2006 I spent 9 months in Thailand teaching at a local High School and assisting at the SVD AIDS Hospital in Nong Bua Lampu. I was ordained a Deacon in March 2008 and had my priestly ordination on the

20th December 2008. I arrived in South Africa on the 15th of September 2009.

I have arrived to this land. While missing home and family, I am excited about finding my place in the beautiful people and land of South Africa. I have often been asked where Fiji is. In reflection, I am asking myself where South Africa is. I am beginning the journey of finding my answers...

It is wonderful to see that there is lots of energy and enthusiasm in these young men.

SVD PHILOSOPHY HOUSE-LUSAKA

The SVD Botswana province set another leap in her contextualized initial formation program when Fr. Marek Marciniak, the vice provincial blessed the new SVD Philosophy House and Chapel in Lusaka, the capital of Zambia. The simple, but colorful ceremony took place on 12, November amidst a solemn Eucharistic celebration presided over by Provincial Fr. Shiju Paul. All confreres from Zambia District, the Provincial council, staff members from St. Bonaventure College where our seminarians pursue their degree in philosophy, and representatives from neighboring religious houses were present for the occasion. The envisioned formation house is to be completed in three stages of construction of which two phases have been completed so far. Bro. Albertus Babu, Frs. Al and Wojciech Szypula have walked extra miles in spite of their teaching assignments at the college to complete those two phases.



WOMEN GOSSIP THE GOSPEL....FOR MEN

In Dambwa Parish, the Church buildings and activities always had a touch and aroma of womenfolk. Every morning the church wakes up not with the bells, but the whispering of women. They are in the forefront in many areas such as opening the doors, sweeping the church, polishing the church, leading all the processions in traditional attire like front line soldiers, sponsoring children and adults for baptism, cooking, watering..., and the list goes on. It seems they have monopolized the church activities. But certainly they have challenged the men folk to commit themselves to the activities of the church. As the saying goes, behind every successful man there is a woman, the women have inspired men to

pull up the socks and do something for the church. They have risen to the occasion and formed an organization called Men's League, the first of its kind in the Diocese. Their motto is Charity, Work and Loyalty. A year of spiritual and organizational preparations was done before 28 men were commissioned on 28th November 2009. As part of their ongoing formation, they have organized annual retreats only for men. The newly commissioned men have brought life and inspiration to many parishioners especially the youths. Now there is a vibrant presence of men in the church especially during the weekends.

New policies require certified copies of various academic certificates along with an advert of the applied post in a local newspaper even for the renewal of permits. Confreres whose Residence Permits are about to expire kindly submit them for the newly required work permits at least six months in advance together with all immigration requirements such as duly filled up form, copy of residence permit, two passport size photos, covering letter, registration copy of the church, copy of contract, copy of passport, certified copies of certificates, original advert of the applied post, P600 for new work permits and P300 for renewals, and an affidavit in case if a permit is lost.
